How fortunate are we to have the beautiful worship services provided by St. John's to connect to our faith and Christian heritage!

It is the task of a search committee to identify clergy who will provide Christian leadership, be in harmony with the parishioners and help grow the church. This commitment from the clergy to the church cannot be one sided. For a call of a new minister to be successful, the parishioners must do their part and make every effort to embrace and support the clergy.

The ongoing "Fireside Chats" are a marvelous example of this behavioral interdependency. Yes, let's praise Gideon for the time, energy and love extended during these ten meetings to reach out and explain his aspirations for St. John's. But let's not overlook the good work of the hosts in opening up their homes, the organizing committee and, most importantly, the many who attended. Thank you.

St. John's supports over 20 worthy organizations; the majority are local. St. Matthias in Haiti and St. John's Day Camp are two signature outreach efforts that make us proud. As a wonderful example of new initiatives, over 100 volunteers came to Bleecker Hall in February as part of our Martin Luther King Day observance. As incredible as it seems the 100 formed an assembly line and packaged 15,000 meals that were distributed to food banks across Long Island.

We hope you will support the good works of the church. This is a parish that gave \$4.7 million over a five-year period in a capital campaign to turn an elegant, but tired church, into the beautiful church that we worship in today. When viewed in that light, our 2018 contribution budget of \$688,000 to meet the expense of operating, maintaining and growing our church should be achievable. Please read the stewardship report enclosed.

I hope you share what many of us feel is a renewed energy emanating from St. John's. Most importantly, thank you for being parishioners. We welcome and appreciate your participation in the life of our beloved church.

Stewardship at St. John's

In our "Fireside Chats," Gideon has enthusiastically delineated the five pillars of our work at St. John's. The first pillar, beautiful worship, reminds us regularly of the tenets of our faith. The other four pillars - supporting families through the entire life cycle, fostering an ever-more-connected community, helping and healing the world around us through outreach, and taking good care of our natural environment - are all key aspects of faithful stewardship. Knowing we start life with nothing, and we leave with nothing, everything we have in between is a gift from God: our interests and talents, our intellect, our families and community, our environment, the nourishment that keeps us going, our material possessions, our financial well-being. All God asks is that we be compassionate stewards of these gifts, put them to good use and give back joyfully in thanks for the bounty that is ours. Our church provides us with the guidance, leadership and inspiration to respond effectively to this challenge. And we as a community of faith are doing well at it.

The strength and momentum of our church depend directly on us. Our support and engagement is what makes St. John's what it is: a spiritual respite from a chaotic world, a sanctuary for our worship, a healthy haven that enables our outreach work, and a place to turn as we navigate life's joys, tragedies and hardships. What does St. John's expect in return? Simple! Three things: engagement in the life of the church, commitment to our mission to seek and serve Christ in all people, and financial participation. It's up to us, collectively, to provide the full funding it takes to operate our facilities and to support the clergy and staff who, in turn, give us the pastoral, spiritual and foundational guidance that imbues this church with its healthy Spirit. It's up to us, individually, to prayerfully and thoughtfully decide, each year, what part we should play, how much to contribute, tangible and intangible. The answer is unique for each of us, and the challenge of finding the answer is part of being good and considerate stewards.

While such decisions are entirely personal and individual, here's some data that may be helpful. The national average for contributions in Episcopal parishes in 2016 (most recent statistics available) was around \$2,770. In 2017, the average gift among our 333 contributors was \$1,728, 4% higher than in 2016 and about 14% higher than in the years 2012 to 2015. For those who pledge, the average commitment was \$2,600; this average has increased about 5% each year since 2012. Total contributions in 2017 were \$574,000, about the same as in recent years, but the expanded scope of the church's missional objectives meant we fell 12% short of the Vestry's budget. What can you and I do about this? With no new contributors, the average gift would have to grow by about 15%. With 45 non-participating member families adding their support, that average would only have to rise by 5%. We ask that all members of the parish take this seriously, by contributing if you haven't done so or by raising the bar if you have.

Making a pledge is a robust way to privately affirm your faith and engage with the spiritual riches St. John's provides. A pledge, however large or small, is simply an expression of hope, expectation, thankfulness and support for the good things happening here. If you haven't already, won't you please consider joining those of us who have pledged, especially as we seek to expand on what St. John's is doing for our parish and for the community we live in? There is still plenty of time to make a pledge for 2018, and there is always a supply of pledge cards on the table at the entrance to the parish hall.

A profound "Thank you!" to the many good stewards of St. John's!
